BILL SUMMARY:

House Bill 3121 amends the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, by adding Sections 56-5-3890, 56-5-3895 and 56-5-3897 which make it unlawful to use an electronic communication device while driving a motor vehicle under certain circumstances. The Bill also amends Section 56-1-720 relating to the assessment of points against a person's driving record for violations to include the new violation of improper use of an electronic devices while operating a motor vehicle.

EXPLANATION OF IMPACT:

The Judicial Department, Department of Motor Vehicles and the Department of Corrections indicate that this legislation would have a minimal impact on the General Fund of the State, which can be absorbed by the agencies at their current level of funding.


LOCAL GOVERNMENT IMPACT:

Pursuant to Section 2-7-76, the State Budget Division surveyed local governments to determine the fiscal impact of this Bill. Two counties reported there would be no fiscal impact and one county reported minimal costs which they could absorb.
