## **State and Local Fiscal Items**



### **General Fund Long-term Trend**

After two years of massive growth in revenue, revenues are returning closer to our pre-pandemic trend, partly due to tax cuts





### **General Fund – Actuals vs. Estimates**

Revenues are \$475.3 million above the estimate through March 2024, but more than 50% of this excess is due to the corporate income tax, a highly volatile source of revenue





### **Corporate Income Tax - Actual vs. Estimate** Corporate income tax revenue remains high but is very volatile





### Individual Income Tax - Actual vs. Estimate Income tax revenue declined as expected due to tax cuts





### Sales Tax - Actual vs. Estimate Sales tax growth is flattening

### **Property Tax Legislation**

- House Bill 3116 Property Tax Exemptions
- Changes three existing property tax exemptions
- 1. Surviving spouses may claim the homestead exemption in the same manner as the deceased.
- 2. A disabled veteran will receive the homestead exemption earlier.
- 3. A motor vehicle for a disabled veteran that is placed in a trust is still eligible for the exemption.



### **New or Pending Enactments**

### • H.3690 – ESG

• Investment decisions by the Retirement System Investment Commission shall only consider pecuniary factors in making an investment decision or when allocating capital to an investment strategy

### • S.298 – Allocation and Apportionment of Income

• Sets forth a process for the Department of Revenue to determine net income. Estimated revenue reduction of \$15,000,000

### • H.3116 – Disabled Veterans Property Tax

- Allows qualified vets to claim the homestead exemption immediately, rather than wait one year
- Surviving spouse may claimed exemption regardless of whether the veteran applied
- Extend the exemption on passenger vehicles to vehicles held in trust but used by an individual who would otherwise qualify

## **Homestead Exemption**

**Excess revenue in the Homestead Exemption Fund** 

- Section 11-11-156(C) Any excess revenue in the Homestead Exemption Fund after fully funding the Tier III reimbursements will be remitted to the counties in the following year to be used as a uniform credit for all owner-occupied properties
- The distribution will be on a pro-rata basis for each county's population relative to statewide population



#### Homestead Exemption Calculating the credit

• Section 11-11-156(C) - The credit is an amount determined by dividing the total estimated revenues credited to the county during the applicable fiscal year by the number of parcels in the county eligible for the credit. Credit that exceeds the tax due on a parcel must be reallocated in a uniform amount to remaining parcels with a property tax liability for county operations....

• This is the current guidance on how to calculate the credit



## Homestead Exemption

#### **Excess revenue in the Homestead Exemption Fund**

• The distribution would be significantly higher in the first year as excess revenue has accrued over the past few years.

#### Homestead Exemption Fund – FY 25 House Budget Proviso 109.19

- The FY 25 House budget includes a proviso to distribute \$500 million of the fund balance as a credit against county operating property taxes on owner-occupied homes
- Counties would receive funding based on population, which results in a different average credit amount by county
- The average credit statewide would be about \$359



#### Homestead Exemption Fund – FY 25 House Budget The average credit statewide would be about \$359; the range by county is from an average of \$277 to \$472

#### Homestead Exemption Fund – FY 25 Senate Budget

- The FY 25 Senate budget allocates \$600 million from the Homestead Exemption Fund
  - \$99 million to accelerate the reduction in the 2024 top marginal income tax rate from 6.3% to 6.2%
  - \$200 million to County Transportation Funds
  - \$100 million to the Dept. of Transportation for bridges and \$117.5 million for the Rural Road Safety program
  - \$15 million for the Rural Infrastructure Fund and \$15 million to the Water and Sewer Fund of the Rural Infrastructure Authority
  - \$53 million to the University of South Carolina Health Sciences Campus construction
