


# **Demographic Trends and Projections**

2020 POPULATION PYRAMID




#### **1970 POPULATION PYRAMID**

TOTAL POPULATION BY COUNTY, 2010








#### South Carolina's Population Change, 2010 - 2020 Varied by county from +30.8% (Horry) to -22.8% (Allendale)




# Migration into the state contributed more to population than the natural change; deaths exceeded births in 2021

TOTAL POPULATION BY COUNTY, 2030



POPULATION CHANGE BY COUNTY FROM 2020 TO 2030









#### South Carolina Age 0 – 17 Population Change, 2010 - 2020 Only eight counties increased in this age group





#### South Carolina 0 – 17 Age Group Based on Births Alone Absent migration, the declining number of births will result in a smaller 0 – 17 population over time


ROLLING 17 YEAR TOTAL OF BIRTHS



The workforce age population is expected to comprise a smaller percentage of the total SC population; employers may be faced with more demand for goods and services but a smaller pool of workers




WORKING AGE VS TOTAL POPULATION

The median age remained almost the same for men but fell for women from 2011 to 2021; both are projected to increase by one year to 42.6 and 42.7, respectively, by 2031




US MEDIAN AGE OF THE LABOR FORCE BY GENDER








65+ AS A PERCENT OF TOTAL POPULATION







#### US Unemployed Persons Per Job Opening The US labor market remains at historic levels of tightness as employers compete over a smaller pool of potential workers








# **Personal Income** SC income through Q4 2022 has grown faster than forecasted, mainly due to higher wage growth





#### US Inflation – History Inflation reached a high of 9.1% in 2022; inflation has not been over 9% since 1981



The current increases in the federal funds rate are faster than other periods in the last 30+ years




CUMULATIVE CHANGE IN FEDERAL-FUNDS RATE SINCE START OF RATE INCREASE

#### **SC Housing Market** Total home sales have declined since the start of interest rate increases; prices are now starting to fall as well





Revenues are running 5.4% over last year, with February bringing year-to-date collections \$535.7 million above the estimate; expected impact of tax reform is now being realized



#### ROLLING FISCAL YEAR - GENERAL FUND




## Withholdings - Actual vs. Estimate

**ROLLING FISCAL YEAR - INDIVIDUAL INCOME WITHHOLDINGS** 



#### Sales Tax - Actual vs. Estimate



US PERSONAL CONSUMPTION EXPENDITURES








#### FY 2022-23 General Fund Revenue & Appropriations – May 2022

Actual and Estimated Revenue vs Appropriation Act Expenses (Net of Tax Reform)






#### FY 2022-23 General Fund Revenue - February 2023 Revision Final FY 22 revenues were higher, creating more surplus for FY 22 and FY 23






#### FY 2023-24 General Fund Appropriations - February 2023 Even with an expected decline in revenues, the base budget is still playing "catch-up"




