#### **BILL SUMMARY:**

Senate Bill 840 amends Sections 44-53-1640(B)(2) and 44-53-1650(D)(8) of the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, relating to the state prescription monitoring program administered by the Department of Health & Environmental Control (DHEC). The Bill clarifies the frequency of reporting by deleting the phrase "at least" so that dispensers now must submit the required information to DHEC every thirty days between the first and fifteenth of each month. Current law states that any data gathered for research or education that would identify a specific recipient, prescriber or dispenser must be redacted prior to disclosure; and that release of the information requires a written agreement between qualified personnel and the Department. However, the Bill provides that release of the information may be made only pursuant to a court order.
